FROM OUR CHAIRMAN

It is my pleasure to welcome you to the July edition of our monthly newsletter. Our museum has again been popular with visitors, particularly now the weather is warmer. By 26th June this had included 288 children, including two classes of 11-year olds from Morland Primary School in Ipswich. Readers will appreciate the importance of explaining to younger generations Station 153's role in the war against Nazism.

Sometimes it feels as though we are part of a large, international family. Our new Prisoner of War room has attracted a lot of interest. As always it is a pleasure to welcome the relatives of those who served. S/Sgt. Marion Laird, flight engineer and gunner, was one of the Ed Weldon crew who became POWs. He has left us fascinating accounts of his parachute jump and the long trek from Stalag Luft III to Moosburg, South of Munich. His son Robert and family were thrilled to see their father featured in the exhibition and have donated more artefacts for our archive.

Another downed airman who became a prisoner was Robert O'Hara of the 571st. His two daughters, Patti and Sheila, visited us with their husbands, right. They too were moved by our exhibition and have given the museum access to more archive material about life in the camps.



A different aspect of the war was illustrated by a visit by the son and family of Major Alexander McElvie, Royal Artillery. Having survived Dunkirk,

he was in command of an anti-aircraft searchlight battery in Monewden, Suffolk. Their HQ was at Brandeston Hall, now the prep school for Framlingham College.

Various historians also contact us. In the last month we have had a visit from one investigating the impact of the P51 Mustang on the air campaign. Another is researching for a TV documentary and asked to see our exhibits relating to the accident in which Joseph Kennedy, John F Kennedy's elder brother, was killed when a bomber converted to a remote-controlled flying bomb exploded prematurely over Blythburgh, Suffolk.

As ever we are indebted to our volunteers, who give a warm, informed welcome to our guests and carry out all those essential jobs behind the scenes. Entries on Trip Advisor have again been very complimentary. Some volunteers even get a personal mention!

I hope you enjoy your reading and we look forward to welcoming you to Station 153 again soon!

is situated on a World War II United States Air Force station.

The 390th Bomb Group Memorial Air Museum pays tribute to the 740 servicemen killed or "missing in action" from this airfield and the further 754 who were taken as Prisoners of War.

The Museum of the British Resistance Organisation provides an insight into "Britain's Secret Army", with contemporary artefacts housed in the Nissen huts and a unique replica secret underground bunker. The museum aims to shed light on "Britain's best kept war secret".

"Words can never truly express our thankfulness to you and your amazing volunteers during our visit to the airstrip and museum last Wednesday, June 5th. It was a magical day that we will remember for the rest of our lives. The kindness, grace and incredible amount of knowledge everyone bestowed upon us was truly remarkable.

I remember as Peter was showing us the Control Tower, I closed my eyes for a moment and was transported back to 1944. I could see the planes using the access roads heading toward the main runway readying themselves for take-off as well as the ground crews making sure everything was just right. I could hear the control tower instructing the pilots they were cleared for take-off and wishing them a safe return home. I could see the relief of the crews and mechanics as they made it back with their planes shot up but everyone safe. For the briefest of moments, I was there.

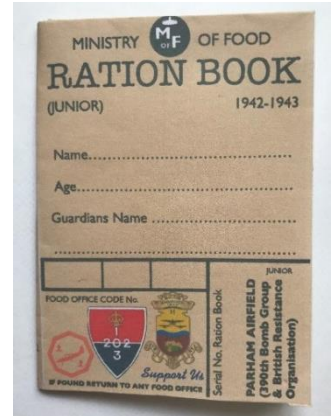

8:30 am: Meet at the National Museum of the USAF

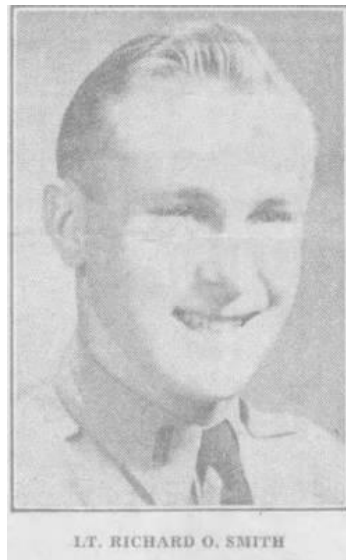
- Join us out front of the Museum for a group photo. Take a chance to look around the Museum, and join our group for the 10:00 am tour.

FROM OUR ARCHIVIST

AIRMAN OF THE MONTH



RICHARD O. SMITH

21 August 1921– 19 July 1944

Richard was born in Pennsylvania and enlisted into the USAAF on 31st August 1942. He trained as a Pilot and tragically flew just 1 mission from Station 153. On mission 153 to Schweinfurt, Richard was piloting 42-30642 'Geronimo'. At approximately 08:45am he called in over VHF and said he could not feather an engine and had to turn around as he was losing altitude fast. The plane crashed at Haren, Belgium with no survivors.

Richard is buried at the Ardennes American Cemetery with the rest of his crew. He was 23.



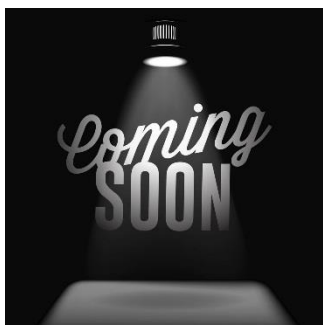

Obituary of Sir Clive Rose GCMG, Former Patron of Parham Airfield Museum

Several hundreds of people crowded the cathedral size Church of St Peter and St Paul, Lavenham, Suffolk, during the afternoon of Friday, 17th May 2019, to commemorate the life of Sir Clive Rose, distinguished soldier, defence expert and diplomat, who died a month earlier, aged 98. They were treated to a festival of music, poetry, memories of his long life and achievements; and his Christian religious commitment.



Sir Clive, one of Britain's most powerful officials, deputy to Sir John, later Lord Hunt, Secretary to the Cabinet and Head of the Home Civil Service, had a variety of worldwide responsibilities during his Government service for which he was honoured with the Grand Cross of St Michael and St George, Britain's highest civil award.

In 1978, Sir Clive was the principal advisor of Constitutional precedents available to the then Prime Minister, James Callaghan, and the PM's powers and responsibilities if it was decided that the country should be placed under Martial Law, during the anxious Winter of Discontent.

After retirement in Suffolk, Sir Clive was a director of Control Risks, a quasi-official public company, skilled as negotiators in cases of terrorist hostage taking and ransom payments. At home, he deployed his wide sphere of influence greatly to the advantage of the people of Suffolk - and the village of Lavenham in particular.

For more than a decade, Parham Airfield Museum was privileged to record him among the list of their Patrons. John and Jill Warwicker represented the Museum at his memorial service.
